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
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ABOUT US

In honor of Mr. Voorhees' vision, civic engagement and service contributions, in 2011 the Voorhees family established the Ralph W. Voorhees Center for Civic Engagement at the Bloustein School. A collaborative effort of university faculty and students and community development actors, the center enhances educational opportunities, facilitates innovative research and engages with communities. The center conducts community based research and is an important place for the discussion of urban problems and innovative policy and practice solutions. The center seeks to enhance dialogue and discussion among communities, government, students, and scholars, increase community development capacity, conduct research on urban problems, and, in partnership with communities, enhance educational opportunities in and outside of the classroom, support the development of innovative responsive public policy and practice, and encourage innovation and entrepreneurship.



Ralph W. Voorhees was a 1948 graduate of Rutgers University, where he was a member of the Phi Beta Kappa honorary society. Mr. Voorhees was senior vice president for investments at Paine Weber, served as a member of ASA Holdings Inc.'s Board of Directors, and as chairman of the boards of the United Way of Central New Jersey, Family Counseling Services of Middlesex County, the Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital, and the New Brunswick Cultural Center. At Rutgers, he was chairman of the University Foundation and served on the University Foundation's Board of Overseers.

He was inducted into the Rutgers Hall of Distinguished Alumni and received the Presidential Recognition and the Loyal Son of Rutgers Awards. He served as a member of the Voorhees College Board of Trustees where he received the Keeper of the Flame Award for continuing his family's legacy of supporting the college.

Mr. Voorhees lived in Highland Park, NJ where his activities spanned health, urban renewal and education and then in New Brunswick. A sterling example of volunteerism and civic engagement at its very best, Mr. Voorhees dedicated many years to service in several areas of university and community life, demonstrating vision, unquestionable altruism, and outstanding success as a philanthropic leader.





RESEARCH CORNER

VOORHEES FELLOWS RESEARCH

HOUSING NAVIGATION

This year, five Ralph W. Voorhees Public Service Fellows worked with New Community Corporation, a community development organization in Newark, New Jersey, to research housing navigation. Part of a Rutgers Equity Alliance for Community Health (REACH) community engaged project, the Fellows sought to better understand the work of contemporary housing navigation.





CENTER RESEARCH



URBAN STUDIES FOUNDATION KNOWLEDGE MOBILIZATION GRANT

Professor Mi Shih and doctoral student Yu Wang's Knowledge Mobilization Grant-funded work sought to engage in diverse forms of knowledge mobilization and to create a digital life for the public engagement work building on the theme of Mi Shih and Kathe Newman's previously funded Urban Studies seminar series about the politics and value of land. While they continue their research, Professor Shih and Ms. Wang have been exploring and testing visualization ideas that transform the research outputs into more accessible and stimulating formats such as a website.


MEASURING INTEGRATION IN AFFORDABLE HOUSING WITH LOCATION DATA

Assistant Professor Bernadette Baird-Zars is the co-PI, along with Dr. Wenfei Xu at Cornell, on a National Science Foundation grant on new measurements of integration that examines how and when residents of subsidized housing in 'high opportunity' areas access services. This fall, six Bloustein undergrad and masters students joined the project team and have met weekly to advance case studies in four US cities: Milwaukee, San Antonio, central NJ, and Denver. Nearly all of the students have lived experience in the case study locations, and, alongside cell phone mobility data analyses, their thoughtfulness and creativity have added exciting nuance to many 'old questions' about what constitutes inclusion and community in the US.

COMMUNITIES AND FLOOD PROTECTION

Dr. Bernadette Baird-Zars and MRCP student Amara Thompkins are part of a research team with NYC-Environmental Justice Alliance and Columbia University that led a national webinar on community-led responses to US Army Corps planned flood protection plans. A masters student on their team led the presentation, and was joined by presentations from organizations like Bayou City Waterkeeper, Wetlands Watch, and Turtle Island Restoration Network.

Undergrads Sean Lamb and Carrie Ward have been working with Baird-Zars and Thompkins on combining community-generated flash flood documentation in New Jersey. Some of their initial findings and predictive models were presented at the New Jersey Climate Change Symposium.



CORPORATE OWNERSHIP OF 1-4 UNIT PROPERTIES IN SEVEN NJ CITIES

Eric Seymour, Will Payne, Kathe Newman, and Lauren Nolan, with a grant from the Robert Schalkenbach Foundation, investigated corporate ownership in: Asbury Park, Millville, Montclair, New Brunswick Passaic City, Phillipsburg, and West New York. The team drew on historical tax parcel property ownership data from 2000 to 2022 to examine the geography and prevalence of corporate ownership of one-to-four-unit residential properties. This project focused on understanding the neighborhoods where corporate owners have concentrating investment over time and the implications of those patterns for current residents.

CORPORATE OWNERSHIP OF 1-4 UNIT PROPERTIES IN NEW JERSEY

With the support of the New Jersey State Policy Lab, the team is expanding research on corporate ownership across New Jersey to obtain a complete view of corporate ownership. The project is allied with the broader NJSOARH project studying housing security, and the team will draw on interviews and other research and data analysis from that project to help answer questions about the reasons for and effects of increasing corporate ownership.





FAITH-BASED AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Nadia Mian was invited to join the US Department of Housing and Urban Development's roundtable on "Repurposing Underutilized and Closed Houses of Worship." Dr. Mian also joined Bricks & Mortals (a New York City based non-profit organization) Mayor's Working Group on Faith-based Affordable Housing and Community Development. She published an article on faith-based affordable housing in *The Conversation*.

HOUSING NAVIGATION

Postdoctoral Associate Matt Mleczko detailed the emergence and evolution of housing navigation and reviewed the decades worth of evidence regarding its effectiveness in a recent working paper. He argues that this history of housing navigation provides important context regarding the historical analogues of contemporary housing problems and solutions in the US. The evidence strongly indicates that housing navigation promotes housing stability, desegregation, and social mobility, but the long-term success of these programs will likely rely on more upstream, structural reforms that address the root causes of housing instability and that, like housing navigation, have roots in the past.



HOME MORTGAGE LENDING IN CAMDEN, NJ

Katharine Nelson (Rutgers University - CLiME), Lauren Nolan, Kathe Newman, Eric Seymour, and Nadia Mian are studying access to home mortgages in Camden in partnership with St. Joseph's Carpenter Society and funding from the Rutgers Equity Alliance for Community Health (REACH). The team is analyzing home mortgage disclosure act data and conducting interviews to better understand access to quality home mortgage credit and patterns of home purchase, refinance, improvement mortgage originations and denials in the period 2018-2022.



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HOMELESSNESS IN NEW BRUNSWICK AND PROGRAMS TO ADDRESS IT

Eric Seymour, Nadia Mian, Emmy Tiderington, and Kathe Newman researched homelessness and the organizational service infrastructures in New Brunswick in partnership with Unity Square Community Organization. The Rutgers Equity Alliance for Community Health (REACH) funded the project. The team conducted 19 interviews with non-profit and voluntary organizations, food pantries, local government, and Rutgers Behavioral Health staff to better understand how homelessness and housing precarity had changed since before the pandemic, to map efforts to address unmet needs, and to identify remaining challenges. They incorporated data about federally assisted housing from NJSOARH. The team shared their findings with the interviewees to facilitate a conversation and integrated the findings into a public report.

NEW JERSEY STATE OF AFFORDABLE RENTAL HOUSING (NJSOARH)


Eric Seymour and Will Payne, Kathe Newman, postdoctoral associate Shiloh Deitz, doctoral candidate Lauren Nolan, and Nadia Mian are conducting research about affordable rental housing in New Jersey. The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation is funding the project. The team has been gathering data on different aspects of affordable housing to better understand the state of affordable housing in New Jersey today. They've:

- Conducted more than 120 interviews with housing professionals across New Jersey.
- Examined rent control in New Jersey and produced a report.
- Integrated separately maintained datasets containing information about rental housing that receives federal assistance and produced a report.
- Analyzed Rental Assistance Demonstration (RAD) program data to better understand how many public housing units have been converted to time delimited assistance.
- Analyzed Home Mortgage Disclosure Act data to explore home mortgage lending trends.
- Conducted field work in seven cities to provide a grounded discussion about neighborhood change and housing insecurity.

The team is currently integrating the housing data and field work into a series of case studies that reflect the variety of NJ's housing markets. The cases are Asbury Park, Millville, Montclair, New Brunswick Passaic City, Phillipsburg, and West New York.









NJ COUNTY RENTAL HOUSING OVERVIEW REPORTS

















RENT CONTROL AND AFFORDABLE HOUSING



Rent Control in New Jersey: The NJSOARH team released a report about the state of rent control in New Jersey. This report traces the history of rent control in the state, describes it today, and offers a set of ideas for the future.



Federally Assisted Housing in New Jersey provides an overview of the landscape of federally assisted housing in New Jersey. It includes a discussion about Public Housing, housing supported with Low Income Housing Tax Credits, and units with a set of other supports including Project Based Rental Assistance. 

ROYAL GEOGRAPHICAL SOCIETY (RGS) - INSTITUTE OF BRITISH GEOGRAPHERS (IBG) ANNUAL INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE LONDON, ENGLAND

AUGUST 2024

Soo Yeon Lim presented her dissertation work, "What is Green?: The Politics of Valuing Green Belt Land and its Transformation from Flower Farms to High-Rises in Seoul Metropolitan Area, South Korea." Her presentation examined the socio-political contestation between land development experts and flower farmers over the value of greenbelt land. Using qualitative methods, the study showed how experts often critique flower farms with polytunnels as environmentally damaging, focusing on the external landscape these structures create. In contrast, farmers emphasize the biophysical productivity and urban greening potential of their farms by shifting attention to the spaces within the polytunnels. These divergent views reveal how political and aesthetic considerations shape the processes of valuing and de-valuing greenbelt land in South Korea.





Andrea Restrepo-Mieth workshopped a paper entitled "Characterizing Subnational Water Affordability Absent a National Mandate: The Case of Volumetric Allowance Programs in Colombia." The manuscript looks at twenty-five municipalities in Colombia to identify the factors that are more closely related to program adoption and implementation (it turns out that utility ownership structure is the best predictor of whether a municipality, regardless of per-capita expenditures or population size, will adopt the program).
